Letter from the Shelter Director by Kit Burke

The care of nearly 500 animals each year is handled by an amazing group of volunteers who are here twice a day, 365 days a year.

The dog walkers come in torrential rain, blistering heat, and frigid temperatures. The dogs learn basic manners, leash walking, play, and are loved; sometimes more than they have ever been before!

200+ kittens arrive, most between April and October. Their care is primarily handled by a dedicated team of foster care providers. These kind people open up their homes and their hearts to take in these babies. Some are orphaned, some need to be bottle fed; all need to be socialized and loved. They keep them sometimes as long as 3 months, bringing them here to see the vet or to be spayed and neutered. Then, in the most selfless way, they return them to us so we can place them in new, loving homes.

The in-house cat care team clean cages, scoops litter boxes, feeds, and loves the 200+ adult cats who live here until a new home is found for them. They play with the cats, monitor their food intake, and waste output! Strong bonds are formed and much love is given. They get to know the tiny details about each cat. What special toy might they prefer? What food is their favorite? The information they gather is very helpful to the adoption team in looking for the right home.

Speaking of the adoption team, they cover all the shelter's open to the public hours - answering questions, taking applications, and processing them. They cover all bases to ensure that the potential adopters are a good fit for a QAS animal.

The medical team is a dedicated group of cat care and dog walking volunteers. They have received additional training on how to give medications to animals in need. They must be reliable, focused, and committed to giving these animals the best possible medical care we can give. A special "vet day" team spends 2-5 hours each Wednesday

working alongside our vet of record, Dr. Kristin Scott of Canton Veterinary Hospital. They assist her with blood draws for testing, vaccinating, documenting, etc. for all of our cats and dogs.

Our feral cat team of "one" runs herself ragged trapping feral cats for spay/neuter or injured cats to end their suffering. She alone brings us half of the kittens we take in and identifies any "friendlies". These cats are ones who were once owned and are now on the street. We take them in as well.

The in-house team is largely supported by volunteers who work "outside" of the shelter. Events, marketing, public relations, and the Board of Directors all work to ensure the QAS image and message is being made public.

Finally, there is all of you! Supporters who bring us items off our wish list: paper towels, bleach, bath towels and more. You bring us food, litter, leashes, and so much more to help. Your generosity is so greatly appreciated!

QAS is made up of all of these types of volunteers. Whatever you do for us, in-house or not, I just want to say a big THANKS to you all!





Until The Last Doodle is Home

September 9, 2014, started out just like any other day at the shelter. Another day of taking care of our cats and dogs. But this day would be different. "Kids 1-12" would enter our lives and leave a mark that will not soon be erased from our collective memories. The "Doodles" as



they have come to be known arrived at the shelter that day, first seven and then another five, all filthy and some with wounds and scars. Their physical condition was upsetting but nothing compared to the anxiety that all over their faces. These 12 dogs were terrified. They had no idea

why there were taken from what they knew as home as deplorable as it was. The Doodles were taken from a home in Quincy and brought to the shelter for holding.

Girly Girl, Kid Rock, Sandy, Flipper, Banjo, Fancy, Checkers, Big Boy, Cha Cha, Seamus, Dinky, and Petunia, from two different litters some were about 5 months old and the rest estimated to be about 18 months old. All needed vet care, so they got examined and vaccinated by Dr. Martha Smith of the Animal



Rescue league of Boston. Their condition had to be well documented for the court case. The story made the local news. The dogs were safe and to us that was all that mattered.

Under normal conditions the shelter had a maximum



capacity of ten dogs. But having ten dogs was not ideal and very stressful for everyone. We now had twelve large Doberman Standard Poodle mixes. We had no idea how long this might last. Would they be here a week, a month? How would we handle this? We were generally

pretty lucky, this was the first time we were faced with such a large undertaking. But still at that time no one would have every imaged that the Doodles would be with the shelter for nearly 18 months. There were a dozen Doodles at first and then in October six dogs were transferred to other facilities. There was an ongoing criminal case. The dogs had to be housed and cared

for until the case was resolved. It was along involved and frustrating legal process. But that is not the focus of the Doodles journey from surviving horrid conditions in basement to having a real home.



The Doodles were now at QAS. It was time to get to work. Some of the doodles suffered from severe anxiety

and had no idea how to get into a car or what a toy was. They now had to get used to being cared for by dozens of new people at the shelter. The volunteers stepped up to the plate immediately and took such wonderful

care of each of these dogs. QAS canine Training Manager, Jean Ellard temperament tested each of the dogs and evaluated their reactions to other animals, people and new surroundings. None of the dogs were house broken and did know how to walk on a leash. The challenges were endless. These dogs needed so much. But most of all they

needed patience volunteers to work with them, bring them home with them, take them to the beach or just sit and brush them. They needed to live like normal dogs. The dogs also were provided with obedience training which help them bond with more humans.

The court case crept through the court system, each time there was a court date, there was hope that the

dogs who still belonged to their legal owner would be surrendered to the shelter so they could be adopted out. It would be awhile before the shelter would get that news. So for nearly 18 months 70 volunteers cared for and fell in love with the Doodles. They were now family. Some dogs were lucky

enough to go for sleepovers and for car rides with our volunteers. It is because of their dedication that these dogs experienced the things that our dogs get to do every day. Their devotion was epic.

Slowly the Doodles were learning how to be dogs. How to be happy

and how to relax. "I was alone in the shelter one day and I heard a noise that was strange, so I walked back

to see what it was and it was Flipper wagging his tail against his bed" Shelter Director Kit Burke, said "the toughest part of this was knowing these dogs were deprived socially, so badly that for months their tails were tucked between their

legs. They slept next to their beds not in them."

While caring for the Doodles daily, the shelter felt the stress of not being able to accept dogs. That meant that dogs that would normally have a spot with us, could not be taken in. The shelter was full. Our cats also felt the strain; they listened to barking doodles all day long. The QAS pocketbook was also being stretched to the



limit. The shelter was untimely responsible for all 12 dogs even though we received help from The Scituate Animal Shelter, JM Pet Resort, Bay Path Human Society, Oxford Animal Control and The Animal Rescue League of Boston, caring for these dogs for 18 months cost the shelter an estimated

\$69,000.00. Upon finding the defendant guilty of seven counts of animal cruelty the judge ordered the owner to pay QAS \$39,000.00. Finally in March of 2016 the Doodles were turned over to QAS. The really great

news is that it did not take long for 11 of 12 of the doodles to be adopted. Most were adopted by volunteers or friends and families of the volunteers.



All of the Doodles are adopted

except for Girly Girl. She was one of the dogs that was very anxious and reactive to some other dogs. "This makes her adoption more of a challenge, but she has

done well and needs an owner who understands her." says Jean.

While the Doodle story is coming to an end, so many lessons about patience, compassion and team



work have been learned here. The shelter and our volunteers were tested daily, it was a lot of hard work and countless hours and resources used to care for the Doodles. The story was not out there in the news because we did not want to jeopardize the court case. Our goal was making these dogs happy and whole. We think we did that. These wonderfully resilient dogs are living the life they have always deserved.

We want to thank the efforts of so many who were involved with the Doodles. Our devoted volunteers lead by Canine Manager, Christina Friel, Canine Trainer,

Jean Ellard and Shelter Director Kit Burke, all of the local law enforcement and animal control officers, The Scituate Animal Shelter, JM Pet Resort, Bay Path

Humane, Oxford Animal Control and The ARL of Boston and most of all the Good Samaritan who called the police. It truly takes a village to save a Doodle.

Update: As of this publication, Girly Girl, the last Doodle, has been adopted.

Adoption Success Story: Koda

Koda, a bully breed, came to QAS as a stray, and he was about to be transferred to another shelter after his adoption to a home fell through. Thankfully, Kevin and his daughter Kayleigh came to QAS in the nick of time. The family had already adopted a female Staffordshire and wanted another bully breed dog. They knew that this type of dog has a stigma about it, and they hoped to save an innocent animal from staying in a shelter for too long.

Koda has proven to be a wonderful pet for the family. Kevin says that he's "the friendliest dog to both humans and other dogs," and that he loves meeting new people. He's also a fun, high energy animal who happens to be quite the goofball. One moment he's playing tug-o-war—he could do it for hours—and the next he's lounging on the bed—and then clumsily falling off—without a care in the world.

His relationship with the other family dog, Bella, continues to grow. They had a bit of a rocky start (hey, it's hard accepting the new baby brother!), but have become best buds. Koda loves to chase and play with her, and the two even sleep on the same bed together.

But it's not all about playtime for Koda. He's taking a obedience class where he's doing well. Next up, Kayleigh plans to do agility training with him.

Carol and Ron are the proud owners of several animals, and they were looking to open their home to another cat in need. After coming across Shadow online, they decided to stop into QAS for a visit. When the couple arrived, they found a very reluctant Shadow hiding in a corner. Without a thought, Carol picked him up. QAS volunteers were taken back by the cat's unusually calm demeanor. Though he'd had responded negatively to others, Shadow didn't have a problem with Carol picking him up. The couple knew they wanted to adopt him..

After seeing how well Shadow had reacted to Carol and Ron, QAS volunteers thought the couple could be a good fit for another hard-to-place cat, Freddie.



He'd had a rough time at QAS; he was adopted and returned, and volunteers feared the borderline feral cat was nearly unplaceable. When volunteers proposed the couple consider Freddie as well, Carol and Ron agreed to take him in as a foster-to-adopt.



Getting Shadow and Freddie adjusted to their new home wasn't so easy. Shadow would swat at his new owners, while Freddie, who Carol described as, "scared to death," had to be separated from the other cats the couple owned. But thanks to their owners' patience, both cats began to come out of their shells.

Today, Shadow is a cuddly, loving cat who's always at Ron's side; and Freddie Spaghetti (as Carol affectionately calls him), once a

terrified feline, is now sweet and playful, and as Ron describes him, "full of piss and vinegar."

Carol and Ron have a theory: if you give an animal its space, its personality will shine through. Thanks to them, Shadow and Freddie Spaghetti are showing a whole new side of themselves, and are living life to the fullest in their forever home.
