# **ALYSON AND MAGGIE**

Maggie, a senior Shih Tzu, hit it off with our volunteer Alyson McNamara right away and she stole her heart. we had dozens of kittens in foster care. Our staff of volunteers was growing too. We had gone from 35 volunteers to more than 100 in a few years' time. The shelter ran 14 volunteer shifts to take care of dozens of cats and dogs each week. The shelter was running on a lot of passion and not a lot of money. Caring for the animals and watching them go home was the fun part; but there was another reality that we had to deal with. We were a business with bills that had to be paid.

Big hearts will only get you so far. We had to get more organized. We had to make the most out of our resources so we could work smarter, not harder and save more animals. As a small shelter in a large city it was quite a challenge. All of our money comes from adoption and surrender fees and private donations. The more animals we took in, the more money we needed to care for them. More food, more cages, more cleaning supplies. Veterinary care was our biggest monthly expense. We did everything we could to keep our costs down. We always wanted to provide our animals with the best care possible and we never wanted to have to make decisions based on the costs. So that meant we had to work hard to raise money. Yard sales, car washes, dances, bake sales and raffles; we did whatever it took to raise money. Wesley's Wish Feral Cat Fund and The Mickey Fund were used to help defray the costs of over and above medical expenses. We were doing ok, but we needed some help. As an all-volunteer organization loaded with a passion for saving animals we didn't always focus planning for the future.

In 2008, our prayers were answered. We need someone to help us with our financial goals. Recruited by Auntie Peg, Bill Sempolinski joined our Board of Directors and still serves as our treasurer. Bill, who is a certified financial planner, had worked in banking for many years and was just what we needed to keep our dream alive and get our financial house in order. It is not easy

for a non-profit organization to stay afloat,but Bill's watchful eye helps us stay in the black.

2005 – 2009 was truly a period of growing pains; we had a few leadership changes and expanded our board of directors. We even survived our one and only ringworm outbreak that closed the shelter for nearly three months; our survival was due to the unwavering commitment of our volunteers.

# THE NEXT WAVE

#### The class of 2005-2009

We learned very quickly that the only way to run a successful animal shelter operation is to have many hands. The more animals we had to care for the more humans we needed. Thankfully, the word was getting out quickly and our volunteer numbers continued to grow. We had monthly volunteer orientations. We now had a feline team, canine team, medical, foster care and a feral cat team and of course we had an adoption team, Each group had a manager and a focus. Some volunteers worked on more than one team. It was all coming together.

We still have 25 volunteers that have been with us for 10-15 years! We appreciate their commitment to our animals. Here are what a few of them had to say about their experiences volunteering with us.

Ann McCarthy does cat care Friday nights and helps with the laundry. "I will always remember when a kitten was found on a Wednesday morning in a tea box left outside the shelter The young male had a visible health issue on his throat and neck. He was named Socks. He was here for close to six months and being a kitten, dying to get out of his cage. It was such a relief when he was fostered in February, 2011 and eventually adopted."

David Cavanaugh has volunteered at the Quincy Animal Shelter for almost 12 years. "I value all the good within nature. I care for cats in the Adult room, play with them, and make them feel at home. I take pride in my work and will always do my best! I love seeing young or territorial cats open up to everyone here, even myself. I hope to continue to be a

great source of help and information whenever possible." We love David's commitment to each and every cat he works with.

**Emily Crump** adopted 3 cats from QAS. "I adopted Chloe and Auggie in 2009. Chloe was very sad and not eating when I got her. She was down to 7 lbs! But she's doing great now. Auggie was my sweetest cat who loved everyone, and was so silly because she loved eating paper died of a heart condition several years ago. And my little Sonia was just a kitten when found stuck in the ice during one of the many blizzards of that awful winter in 2015. Her tail partially died, and about a third of it had to be amputated. But when I saw her at the shelter, she stole my heart with her sad face, and penchant for belly rubs."

Five years ago **Jonathan Danho** and his wife Nicole Lecuivre had a special photo taken for their wedding in 2014 as part of their donation to the shelter in lieu of wedding favors. # A DAY IN THE LIFE OF A QAS DOG!

One reality at QAS is that the cats outnumber the dogs nearly all the time. We can care for about 25 cats and 13 dogs at maximum capacity. Our shelter also does not have the luxury of separating the cats and dogs. When full, the shelter can be a hectic and stressful place for all of the animals. It is very important for them to get some stress free "me" time.

Sometimes visitors will come in and feel bad for the dogs who are in their kennels. Of course we want them to be adopted, but while they are at QAS, they get tons of attention, The thought of a shelter may seem sad and depressing place to many but when you've seen some of the backgrounds that our dogs have come in with, we take comfort knowing they are safe and provided for at QAS.

The QAS canine team is a dedicated group of volunteers that are trained to care for our dogs by taking them

for a walk, or an outing like a trip to the Blue Hills for a nice trail run or maybe just a car ride to sit at the beach for a while. They teach them basic obedience and of course paying those lots of attention which always includes a back scratch or a belly rub. Each volunteer is assessed on their dog handling skills and matched with dogs that they can handle well. A color coding system is used to match the volunteers and the dogs. When a dog comes in it might be very scared and hard to handle so a more experienced dog walker will be assigned to care for that dog. As the dog settles in it might be downgraded to a lower level and then more walkers can handle the dog. All of this is done to ensure the safety of both the dog and the volunteer. All of our dogs are seen by a veterinarian, given an exam, vaccinations and are spayed or neutered and microchipped. The dogs are also tested by our canine training team to see what kind of behavior traits they have and what

type of adopter will be best suited for them.

Our dogs are not spoiled, they are loved. We take pride in providing them with basic training so that they can be successful in their new home. We also want to know about you too. Our adoption process is pretty standard; we want to know what you want. What will make you and your family happy? If you're a couch potato we will not suggest a Border Collie. If you are a first time dog parent we will suggest an "easy going" breed for you. If we have a dog with a health concern, we will let you know everything so you can make an educated decision. We do our best to make the best match possible.

### **Dog Gone Lucky**

We have been very luck to attract so many talented dog volunteers and trainers. Since 2013 our dogs have been very fortunate to have Christina Friel as the Canine Manager. Christina will step down as manager this summer but will continue to volunteer as part of the canine team and focus on adoptions.

Christina came to QAS in 2010 and was also volunteering for the Marshfield Animal Shelter. She had volunteered for other shelters before moving to Massachusetts.

"I'm too attached to QAS to leave completely so will be focusing on adoptions and dog walking when needed which is what I was doing when I first started at the shelter. I've seen many things change over the years but one constant is that the dogs need love and help. Despite working in Boston and now living south on the Marshfield/Duxbury border, I'm doing my best to squeeze in time for QAS. The dogs
