all deserve. There must be a way to control the pet population; there must be a better way!


And while we know that you cannot realistically save them all, you can certainly try! We will continue to

SINGLE KITTEN SYNDROME

Why 2 Kittens Are Better Than 1

QAS does not have a policy requiring 2 kittens to be adopted together like many shelters, but we do encourage it and here is why.

Sometimes solo kittens will be returned because they start developing destructive habits – such as scratching furniture and biting human family members. Kittens bite and wrestle with one another-this behavior is normal. They need to burn off energy. In the absence of having a littermate or companion their own age to play with, a single kitten will want to bite and playwrestle with their humans. That will get old, and you do not want a biting

kitten to turn into a biting cat. Pairs of kittens can understand cues from each other - in many ways, your pets will train each other. Adopting two kittens at the same time can make your life easier. They will entertain and exercise each other while you are at work. It is easier to train two kittens at the same time. Both kittens are likely to enjoy the same food, use the same type of litter, and play with the same toys. We suggest that everyone consider adopting a pair of kittens. They do not need to be from the same litter but that usually works out very well. If you already have a cat at home, then we encourage safe introductions and patience so they

can form a successful bond. Kitten season is just around the corner so consider adopting an instant family! (Partial Credit: Just One More Kitty)



PETS FOR PATRIOTS



"Every day, 20 veterans take their own lives; every eight seconds a cat or dog is put to death because it does not have a home. Pet adoption can save two lives" (petsforpatriots. org)

We are proud of our relationship with Pets for Patriots. The vision of P4P is to put an adopted pet in the home of every veteran who needs one. By working with animal shelters, Pets for Patriots helps United States military veterans adopt a new pet while giving the most overlooked shelter animals loving homes. They focus on animals that might be euthanized or ones that have been in a shelter for a long time.

Pets for Patriots partners with veterans, 237 animal shelters,116 veterinarians and 898 pet care centers across the country. Veterans who adopt will receive a range of benefits to reduce the lifetime cost of having a pet. In 2023, 286 dogs and 80 cats were adopted

by US military veterans through this program. Additionally, they provide hardship support so that veterans can keep their own animals at home. There is a significant amount of information on their website detailing how it works, pet criteria, the benefits, and how to apply for services. FERAL CAT TEAM HELPS GIVE MOJO A HAPPY ENDING

In Spring of 2023, I started seeing a skinny tuxedo cat lurking around my ground floor porch. I was alerted to him by my cat Tica, who howled and scratched at the glass slide door whenever he stopped by at night. I would get out of bed and watch while they peered warily at each other through the glass and started leaving dry food out since I assumed he was a feral cat who was hungry and scrounging for food. He devoured the food but wouldn't come near me, so I decided to just feed him and let him live his life. I had fed a few feral cats before but they eventually stopped coming-I assumed they hadn't survived the winter or been killed through illness or a car. I never thought about trapping them.

One night I brought food out but stayed on the porch and called to him in a gentle voice. He approached cautiously, sniffed my hand but ran away. I did this the next few nights until he let me pet his shiny dark head. Obviously, he wasn't feral, just lost or abandoned. Little by little, he started to trust me, allowed longer pets and would sprawl out on the porch to hang out with me while Tica watched from inside. Eventually

she came outside and they sniffed, she hissed and the gentlemanly guy backed off. I started calling him Mojo.

Mojo got comfortable enough to snatch treats out of my hand and started visiting more frequently. He came inside a few times to check the place out but Tica made clear this was her territory. He respected her wishes and the last time he was inside, in a rare lapse from good manners, sprayed the television stand and left. He needs neutering, I thought, and a real home, but I was leery about trying to get him in a carrier. I couldn't keep him but knew I must get this smart, sweet, handsome guy off the streets into a forever home where he never had to worry about where his next meal was coming from.

I contacted QAS Feral Program
Manager Jodie Bouma and was put
in touch with Roxanne Murphy, a QAS
volunteer who traps stray cats and
helps others trap cats. She showed
me how to use the trap and little
by little each night Mojo crept in a
bit farther to get his food. One hot
summer night I heard Tica making a
commotion when Mojo arrived and
this time the cage snapped shut with
him inside. It broke my heart to see
him scared and confused, but I knew
this was best for him.

I brought him into the shelter, where he was neutered and received his shots. He was nervous and mostly stayed in back of the cage even though I visited him, so I worried he wouldn't find a home. But a woman on my QAS volunteer shift, Annie Louie, saw the potential in sad, scared Mojo and took him home to foster him. His good manners and quiet charm won her over, her devotion and love won him over and she adopted him. Mojo got the happy ending he deserved!

Please don't assume you can't do anything to help stray cats. Many are lost and frightened, and many who seem feral can become wonderful companions with patience, understanding and love. There are so many dangers to living outside for these poor creatures. I want to give a shout out to the QAS Feral Team for their wonderful work and unwavering dedication to these cats who are often ignored and forgotten. This happy ending is just one of the many happy endings they have made possible!

THE LEGAL BEAGLE

SEE SOMETHING, SAY SOMETHING



There is NO excuse for Animal Abuse. Not everyone treats animals the same way. Of course, we love them and treat them as part of the family, but to some they are disposable, void of feelings and emotions. Animals deserve proper care, and under the law, domestic animals must have access to food, water, and shelter. On the one hand we have seen a rise in awareness, rescue, and adoption, yet we are seeing increasingly sad stories on the nightly news about all kinds of animals being abandoned or abused. The Quincy raccoon story really hit home. Yes, some wildlife can be a nuisance, but none deserve such a horrific fate as being burned alive in a trap. It is sickening to imagine the fear and pain this animal suffered. All animals have protection under this law. MGL chapter 272. Section 77. Please see the statute for more the full narrative.

Any person or person who... knowingly and willfully authorizes or permits it to be subjected to unnecessary torture, suffering or cruelty of any kind shall be punished by imprisonment in the state prison for not more than 7 years in state prison or imprisonment in the house of correction for not more than 2 ½ years or by a fine of not more than \$5,000 or by both fine and imprisonment; provided, however, that a second or subsequent offense shall be punished by imprisonment in the state prison for not more than 10 years or by a fine of not more than \$10,000 or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Any suspected abuse should be reported to the proper government authorities. If an animal is in imminent danger, you should call the local or state police. If the situation is not an emergency, but you know of or suspect animal abuse or neglect, contact your local animal control officer, the Animal Rescue League 617-426-9170 #2, or the MSPCA Law Enforcement Department at 617-522 6008 or 800-628-5808.

Reading to shelter animal programs are known to be highly effective in lowering the stress of dogs and cats, since animals in the shelter environment get more stressed the longer that they are in the kennels. The Quincy Animal Shelter, for the first time, has started a reading to dogs and cats' program for children aged 8 to 12. The children bring their favorite book and sit in front of the kennels and read to our resident dogs and cats.

The program will be held monthly on Sundays and during the school vacation week. Our first session was on February 11th and the effect on the dogs was amazing. Right now, we have a full waiting list, but we will open the program up again for signups soon.

Reading programs are a win-win for everyone: it is a win for the dogs because they get calming attention, and it is a win for the children as well. Most shelters do not allow people under the age of 18 to volunteer simply because it has become a liability so the only way for children to "volunteer" with animals is with special programs like this. This was one of the reasons why we started

this program; to allow children to begin to volunteer with shelter animals which helps children, helps the dogs and cats, and helps our community.

So far, our new program is getting rave reviews!
